Our ancient curse, we could not see, making our peace in crowds of violent harmony. For thus since Eden's fall victims unite us all. No more of this, no more of this, remember me.

Were the whole realm of nature mine, that were a present far too small; Love so amazing, so divine, demands my soul, my life, my all.



The cross is the central symbol of Christianity. Some say Christianity would be better off without it. Others say the faith that Christ died for us *is* Christianity. This conflict reflects a paradox embedded in the gospel narratives themselves: Jesus' death saves the world, and it ought not to happen. There is a saving act of God in the cross, and there is a sinful human act. These two are so close together that it's easy for them to get mixed up in our understanding and practice. Welcome our Lenten Program Leader: S. Mark Heim

Mark is the Samuel Abbot Professor of Christian Theology at Andover Newton Seminary at Yale Divinity School. He has studied, taught, and written extensively on comparative theology, religious pluralism, atonement, ecumenical relations, and science and theology, receiving numerous awards. An ordained American Baptist minister, Mark has served on the World Council of Churches and on many ecumenical commissions.

In the spring of 2024, Mark and his wife Melissa walked a portion of the Camino de Santiago pilgrimage, and in the fall, they spent 6 weeks in Rome where Mark taught at the Gregorian University in a program that brings together Catholic, Orthodox, and Protestant Christians to study each other's traditions. Mark also co-teaches a course on theology and medicine with Prof. Benjamin Doolittle from Yale School of Medicine; they are currently completing a book on the interface of faith and medicine. Mark and Melissa live in New Haven and especially delight in time with their two grown children and two grandchildren in Washington, DC and Philadelphia.
