Pastor's Column

One day Jesus took Peter, James and John up to the mountaintop. When they reached the summit Jesus's face began to shine like the sun, and his clothes were as bright as a freshly laundered white linen suit. Out of nowhere, the great prophets Moses and Elijah appeared, and stood talking with him. Not knowing what to do, Peter suggested they set up three tents for the luminaries. At that moment, an immensely bright cloud overwhelmed them and a powerful voice declared, "This is my son, the beloved; with him I am well pleased; listen to him!" Astonished and full of fear, Peter, James and John fell to the ground. The cloud lifted, and Jesus walked over and touched them. He told them not to be afraid. Together, they walked down the mountain to where the other disciples and crowds were waiting. The Bible calls this story the *Transfiguration* of Jesus. It was only after the resurrection of Jesus that they began to trust the depth and reality of their own experience.

At times in our lives we, too, may have experiences that are overwhelming and inexplicable. I believe I had such an experience one day as I was trudging through deep snow across a wide and open field. Eli and Karen were way up ahead hurrying home to get out of the late, frigid Saturday afternoon. I was out of breath and peeved they had left me behind when I stopped for a moment's rest. At once all sound and motion ceased. The pink and yellow clouds came to rest and the sun stopped on its journey to the horizon. No breeze touched my cheek, and my breathing slowed dramatically. I felt the life-giving rhythm of my heart in a new and mysterious way. Time disappeared. I was no longer a creature moving through the world or separate from it. Everything, the sun, the earth, the air, my heart, even time itself, were one, inseparable and indistinct. In that moment there was neither *then* nor *when*, but simply *now*, brimful with the glorious mystery we name God. Then a small bird slashed across my vision and everything began moving again. I headed back home. I had no idea what had happened, but felt like I had been overshadowed by the Great Mystery. I still can't make heads nor tails of it. But, as I share my story with others, I experience again, a taste of the promised peace surpassing all understanding. Whenever I tell this story I savor again, that exquisite moment when God's grace stood me still and enveloped me in the Love that is *right now*.

Years after, he stood on the mountain top with Jesus, Moses and Elijah, Peter wrote to a church suffering a crisis of faith. Some church leaders were convinced Jesus wasn't really a person at all, but a divine mani-

festation absent of flesh and blood. They were increasingly persecuted, uncertain and confused, feeling abandoned by Jesus who had not yet returned. Their hope was slipping away. Peter urgently reminds them to trust their own experience. They were given a faith like his own. They knew Jesus Christ created their community of love, where they shared their lives and hope, supporting one another in mutual love and affection. They had been saved by the faith that resurrection was theirs, and Jesus was returning for them soon. Even if the others had doubts about what they experienced, they should trust Peter's. He wasn't selling them a bill of goods, made up of strange myths and wild tales. He hadn't invented a great something from nothing. Peter informed them, that what was seen and heard was the glory of God shining through Jesus. Recognizing the truth and depth of his story, members of the small community believed. They began again to experience God's presence in their lives and bravely shared their stories with others. Even now, we can hear their voices while reading Peter's eyewitness account of the transfiguration of Jesus Christ. We are the heirs of their faith and hope. (continued)

I believe most folks come to faith, not by well-reasoned philosophical or theological argument, but through the storytelling of others who have experienced the presence of the living God. Whether standing on a mountaintop or in a snow-covered field, whether sitting with a grieving friend or stuck in traffic, these moments are God's gifts that we might live in faith and hope. We may never know what the sharing of our first-hand experience of God's presence may mean to others; we can believe that through our sharing, God shapes us.

Church Council

At the January Congregational Meeting, in addition to approving both the 2020 Annual Operating Budget and Annual Capital Budget, the congregation reelected Kit Engstrom for a new 1-year term as Treasurer, and elected Penny Rogers to 2-year terms on the Nominating Committee. Thank you both for your willingness to serve in these important positions. January is also when we elect new members of the Board of Stewardship, but no nominees came forward. In May we will be electing members to most of our committees and boards as well as a Moderator and a Clerk. I

would encourage everyone to consider board/committee service and to let the Nominating Committee (Judi Reynolds, Penny Rogers and Janice Touloukian) aware of your interest. Also feel free to talk with myself or current members of a board/committee to learn more about the function of that board/committee. A reminder, several of the boards and committees are open to friends of the church – those individuals who attend services regularly or who make a contribution to the congregation but who are not members.

The vote to pass the 2020 Operating Budget was not unanimous in part because the budget left some line items underfunded. The budget included pledge income for 2020 of just over \$95,000. We are working on sending out a follow-up appeal and I want to urge anyone who has not yet pledged for 2020 to do so that we can make up the shortfall that led to the underfunded line items and help the church out with our mission. Thank you to Baron Jones and the Stewardship Committee for the wonderful work on the 2020 campaign. Thanks also to those in the members of the congregation who made personal calls encouraging pledging to parishioners who are regular attendees. My gratitude to the Trustees for the difficult work they did in creating the 2020 budgets.

On Sunday March 8, there will be another First Church Renewal session in the Memorial Room after the church service. At this session we will hear from our various boards and committees about their views on the future of their board/committee and of the church, as well as the target audience they feel we should seek out in trying to gather information on the future direction of the church. I encourage everyone to attend. Council will be meeting next on Monday March 2 at 7 pm. in the Board room. Every one is welcome to attend.

Our Church's History

Following the initial "Who Knows?" in last month's Parishioner, some inquisitive people asked "why" and "how" the church got started? Exactly what happened? Last month we stated that the parish of Amity (First Church) was established by the Connecticut General Assembly in Hartford in 1738. But how did they get to that point? Here's the story.

In colonial days the part of New Haven west and northwest of the main town was called Chestnut Hill. At the same time the area in the northern part of Milford including Orange, Woodbridge, Bethany and the present day South Naugatuck (See the map from the Milford Tricentennial book, 1939) was called North Milford. The dividing line between Milford and New Haven started on the shoreline, Long Island sound, and divided the towns to the north. Today, this division line is Milhaven Rd. in Woodbridge. Due to the difficulty of travelling to worship services in either Milford or New Haven, in 1734 the general assembly of Connecticut granted the request of the inhabitants of Chestnut Hill and North Milford the right to "winter preaching" for five years and absolved them from paying taxes during those winter months.

Imagine yourself living in Chestnut Hill or North Milford in the 1730s. The hills were wilderness, back country. They were inhabited by only the hardiest descendants of the original Puritan migration. These farmers were totally self-reliant, capable of withstanding backbreaking toil in the most adverse conditions. And they were also believers. They wanted to worship year round. The granting of "winter preaching" in 1734 provided the impetus for the establishment of The Parish of Amity five years later.





Who Knows?

1) This home (pictured above) is located at 1194 Racebrook Road. Historically significant as the home of two prominent Woodbridge families (Newtons and Baldwins). Parts of the home were built as early as 1740 as a Newton homestead. In this home was born the Reverend A) (1795-1865). He married in 1813 Betsy Baldwin the

(1795-1865). He married in 1813 Betsy Baldwin the daughter of Silas Baldwin and Mary Smith. The First Church of Christ sponsored him along with other missionaries to help the B)

(name the tribe) in 1821. Unfortunately, Betsy and her infant boy died during the journey west. After

being a missionary Reverend Newton was among those who settled San Antonio, Texas. He died in 1865, three years after the death of Samuel Houston. Later the home pictured became the Woodbridge Hunt Club, 1911 – 1930. (Answers on page 5)

Sanctuary Repainting Update, February 18, 2020

The John Canning Company has completed its consultation services for the repainting of the sanctuary. David Riccio, a Canning VP, shared their results and recommendations with the congregation on January 12 in an informative, fascinating, and inspirational presentation.

A final comprehensive written report including renderings and an itemized budget was received on February 14. It available to interested parties on the church website at www.uccw.org, by email (on request), or as a hard copy at the church office.

The next step will be to provide the State Historic Preservation office the required documents for a 50% reimbursement for the \$10,800 cost of the Canning consultation services.

Soon, the Board of Trustees will scrutinize the proposed budgets, consider making application for another SHPO grant (up to \$100K matching), decide if we will need to do the work in stages, and to decide how best to raise the money necessary to complete the repainting. Persons from the congregation and wider community are welcome to participate in this process. We are most grateful that some have already expressed a financial commitment for this work.
